RIDGWAY SCHOLARSHIP

The Ridgway Scholarship offers an opportunity for a student who is normally resident in Lincolnshire or Huntingdonshire (before the boundary changes of 1974) to study for an academic year at the University of Evansville in the USA.

The scholarship is usually most attractive to those students completing their last year of secondary education and looking for a 'gap year' opportunity to study and travel in the USA. The Scholarship pays international air fare, all tuition costs, and room and board accommodation for a year of study at the University of Evansville in Indiana. As a major international scholarship, the grant offsets education costs of more than \$40,000.

Two students from the King's Sixth Form were interviewed at Harlaxton Manor earlier this month. Samuel Lee selected as the Ridgway Scholar for 2016-17.

STUDENT ACHIEVEMENTS

TABLE TENNIS

Matt Leete (Year 11) exceeded expectations and just missed out on a medal as he competed against the best players in England at the Junior National Cup earlier this month.

Matt, who plays for Cliffedale Chandlers and Grantham College Table Tennis Academy, was invited to the tournament in Milton Keynes because of his position near the top of the Table Tennis England rankings. He took on nine other top players in a round robin event.

Seeded ninth for the event, he won six matches, only losing to the top three seeds.

Matt said "It was a lot better than I expected, finishing fourth when I was seeded ninth, so I'm pleased with how I played."

WATERPOLO

King's were the only non-independent school to secure a place in the English Schools U15 Boys/Mixed National Finals in Bolton earlier this month.

The opening rounds saw the team take on Haberdashers' Aske, London and Trinity School, Croydon. Their first match went well, although a last-minute goal from Haberdashers' saw the game end in a 2-2 draw. Their second game against Trinity needed to be a win to get a place in the semi-finals. The boys scored a goal in the first half and continued to play a defensive game in the second to secure a last-four place.

The semi-final saw them play Alleyns School and despite going ahead in the first half, Alleyns scored twice in the last few minutes. King's came up against Trinity again in the play-off to decide third and fourth place. At the end of the first half, King's were down 3-1 but in the second half they bravely fought back to score twice to tie the match at 3-3. This led to a penalty shootout which King's lost on sudden death.

CHESS

Daniel Southern of Year 12 competed in the British Problem-Solving Society's Championship at Eton College on 20 February. Daniel qualified for this event as a result of being in the King's team that won the schools national team championship last year. He faced competition of the very highest standard including six ex-world champions and 14 Grandmasters, most notably two famous British players; Dr John Nunn (who was the youngest undergraduate since Cardinal Wolsey at Oriel College, Oxford and competed in the semi-



final of the World Championship), and Dr Jonathan Mestel (Professor of Mathematics at Imperial College London). The event also attracted champion solvers from Poland, Ukraine, Germany

and Holland. In such distinguished company Daniel faced an enormous challenge. However, after five hours of problem solving with six different themes and lots of hard work, he finished in second place in the Junior Competition.

Daniel will be leading the King's Team in the Schools' Team Problem Solving Final at Imperial College in April when they attempt to retain their national title.

LEARNING RESOURCE CENTRE

The Year 7 Knight's Tournament began at the beginning of last term. This tournament challenges the boys to read as many of the selected history titles (both fiction and non-fiction), write a review (at least one side of A4 lined paper) per title in their own handwriting and in return they get a house point for each book read. This is an initiative between the LRC and the History Department to encourage literacy in other subjects other than Eng-



lish. Thanks are recorded to the PTFA for helping to fund the books required for this project.

Reading is continuing at a steady rate throughout the school with the range of boys reading/borrowing from all year groups.
